- **EXPLORE THE BIBLE** is a lesson that connects The 7 Ways of Living Generously to God's Word. Students will explore the meaning of Bible verses and make personal connections with Scripture. A coloring page is included for each Bible verse.
- DISCOVER WITH FRIENDS features a captivating and relatable story about each of The 7 Ways of Living Generously told by friends from the Generosity Jungle. Discussion questions and activities are included to reinforce learning.
- HIT THE TRAIL includes practical and easy-to-implement activities that allow students to practice and experience Generosity together.
- **BE BOLD** is an invitation to live out The 7 Ways of Living Generously and empowers students to take immediate action at school, at home, and in their community.



START WITH GRATITUDE

At Generous Students, we believe a grateful heart is the best place to start. Each adventure begins with a written GRATITUDE JOURNAL exercise. This allows your students to experience the benefits of writing down what they are thankful for while building a habit of gratitude.

LESSON 1 begins with a GRATITUDE JOURNAL entry. LESSONS 2-5 begin with a START WITH GRATITUDE exercise to build a grateful habit and attitude. This can be done in numerous ways. See START WITH GRATITUDE in the Teacher Portal for creative ways to lead this portion of the program.

An adventure is an experience that helps us see the world from a different view than our own. We get to learn new things along the way. As a class, we are going on an adventure to learn about Generosity!

The words "generous" and "Generosity" may be new to you today, but by the time we finish this adventure, you will be experts! Throughout our adventure, we are going to learn from God's Word. And we will meet some new friends who will teach us about Generosity along the way. We'll put our learning into action and help make the world a better place with our generous hearts.

Are you ready for an adventure? Of course you are! Let's ENTER THE ADVENTURE, EXPLORE THE BIBLE, DISCOVER WITH FRIENDS, and BE BOLD together!

We'll experience 10 unique adventures together. In each adventure, we are going to learn something new about Generosity. We will also learn a cheer that helps us remember The 7 Ways of Living Generously. We will keep practicing this throughout our lessons. You can even practice the cheer with a friend when you are at lunch, recess, or on the bus.

To get started, we're going to learn the opening of the GENEROSITY CHEER and the definition of Generosity which is — to give, share, and show you care. Our cheer has hand motions, so let's stand up, and learn the GENEROSITY CHEER together!

LESSON 1 (CONTINUED) ENTER THE ADVENTURE

START WITH GRATITUDE

As we set out on our adventure, you'll notice the word generous comes up a lot! Generous is another word for "kind." Being kind means wanting to do good and bring happiness to others. It means showing the goodness of your heart and acting in a caring way.

Can you think of ways you have been kind to someone else?

Some examples of what it means to be kind or generous include —

- Cheerfully giving your favorite candy bar to a good friend.
- Spending time with a visitor at your house even though you'd like to do something else.
- Asking for a sticker for your sibling when the grocery store clerk gives you one.
- Sharing your crayons during art time.
- Having kind thoughts about yourself.
- Giving your classmate a compliment.

There are so many ways you can be generous! The best way to get your mind ready for our generous adventure is to look around you and think about something or someone that makes you happy. When you think about the people and things that you are thankful for and that make you happy, it's called being grateful.

A grateful heart is the best place to begin the generous adventure. Each time we learn about Generosity, we're going to ENTER THE ADVENTURE by thinking of something or someone we are thankful for. Then we are going to draw a picture of it. You can even write about it if you want an extra challenge!



Model how to complete the GRATITUDE JOURNAL with a personal entry.

Now it's your turn! Let's begin by closing your eyes and thinking about a person or thing that makes you feel like you could burst with joy and thankfulness. Got it? Let's go!



Direct students to complete their first GRATITUDE JOURNAL entry.

EXPLORE THE BIBLE

SCRIPTURE CONNECTION



★ LESSON PREPARATION: Display Bible poster.

Today we're going to see and hear a very special Bible verse. Did you know that the Bible is God's Word given to us so that we can know Him better? It's full of amazing stories, adventures, and lots of truth for us. Jesus gave it to us so that we can live a joy-filled life.

First, let's take a look at the Bible verse on our EXPLORE THE BIBLE poster. Look at the picture and be ready to tell me one thing you notice.

Now, listen closely to the Bible verse. Put your finger on your nose if it sounds familiar or if you've heard it before.

For God so loved the world, that He gave His one and only Son...

— John 3:16a

Wow! Does anyone in our class know this Bible verse by heart?
Do you want to share it with us?

Let's say this first part of John 3:16 together: "For God so loved the world."

The first words say, "For God so loved the world."

Do you know why this verse is so important?

It is important because God loves the WHOLE world, including you, your family, and your friends. He loves the people who live way across the world from you. Wow, that's a lot of love!

The rest of the verse says, "That He gave His one and only Son..." God GAVE. He didn't have to give us Jesus, but He did. God was very generous to give Jesus to us. He continues to be generous with His love for us every day.

The poster we looked at is a great picture that helps us understand what John 3:16 means. Now that we've seen a picture of the Bible verse and heard it with our ears, let's color the picture.

We'll keep it as a reminder that God loved the world so much that He gave His only Son to the world. God, the Creator of everything, is so generous to us!



Direct students to the John 3:16 coloring page and provide time to complete it. If time allows, have students share what John 3:16 means to them.

Now that our hearts and minds are in a grateful place — it's time to discover Generosity! Our animal friends are going to tell us fun stories and will help us learn about Generosity. Their stories will help us find ways we can be generous to our friends and family.

Today we will meet a very special friend who is coming on our Generosity Adventure with us— Jasper G— he is the cousin of the Generosity Giraffe that is here in our classroom! The Generosity Giraffe will introduce us to some of his jungle friends. They have incredible stories to share with us.

We will also learn what the Bible teaches us and from each other as we journey toward becoming lifelong givers! The Generosity Giraffe visits us often in our classroom. You may even see him pop up at your desk! He's always looking for students who are generous. Let's take a look at him.



Introduce the Generosity Giraffe stuffed animal and give students the opportunity to see, touch, and even talk to the stuffed animal.

What do you notice about the Generosity Giraffe?

- He has glasses to see opportunities to be generous and to pay close attention to who is in front of him.
- His long neck helps him to be aware of the people near and far.
- He has a bow tie because he likes to look snazzy!

Let's read our first story called Jasper G and the Me-Thinking Madness.

LET'S TALK ABOUT GENEROLITY TO JOY, SHAPE, and show you care. There are 7 wast to Live generously!

APPLICATION TIME

Today we're going to look for Generosity in pictures. Remember, someone who chooses to give, share, and show they care is a generous person.

I'm going to show you six pictures of different things happening. Your job is to look at the picture and decide if you see Generosity in the picture.



Before doing the activity as a class, model how to identify Generosity by thinking aloud. Example: I'm going to look for someone giving, sharing, or showing that they care. I notice the person in this picture is smiling at the other person. Smiles make people feel good. I love when people smile at me. I definitely see Generosity here!

Display one picture at a time and have students determine where they see Generosity. There can be more than one example of Generosity in each picture!



Is someone in the picture being generous through giving, sharing, or caring? Those pictures were great examples of the different opportunities we have to be generous.

I wonder what pictures we'd see if someone had a view of our classroom and looked for ways we choose to be generous with one another. Are there moments throughout your day when you can be generous at school—when you can give, share, or show you care?

Examples:

- Sharing a ball on the playground.
- Giving an extra snack to a friend.
- Saying kind words.

- Using manners.
- Giving a friend a compliment.

Let's brainstorm some ways we can be generous to one another while we're at school.



Write down student ideas on the board and celebrate when they've come up with a big list! Close by challenging each student to try one of the ideas they came up with this week. Have them report back to you afterward.

Today's START WITH **GRATITUDE** activity is to complete a journal entry on page 9.

GENEROSITY CHEER

Let's stand up and add this to our cheer!

Let's talk about Generosity! To give, share, and show you care. There are 7 ways to live generously! Thoughts: use a thought in my mind to think something kind.

I'm going to ask you two questions, and you will keep the answers in your mind without saying anything out loud.



TEACHER TALK is in bold text throughout the adventure.

What color is the sky?

What is your favorite food?



After a moment of thinking, allow students to share their answers.

How did it feel to hold a thought in your mind about yourself without saying it out loud? Next, hold this thought in your head: I'm a good friend because...



After a moment of thinking, allow students to share their answers.

How did it feel to hold that thought in your mind without saying it out loud? You just held a thought about yourself in your mind! Sometimes thoughts can make us feel happy, angry, excited, frustrated, grateful, or sad. And it's absolutely okay to feel all of those feelings. A Generous Thought happens when we think something kind about ourselves or others. We're going to learn more about how we can choose to have Generous Thoughts in this adventure.



LESSON 2 EXPLORE THE BIBLE

GRATITUDE DISCUSSION IDEA:

Who is a family member that you are grateful for? Why?

★ LESSON PREPARATION

- Display Bible poster.
- Have two clear cups ready one with clear water, the other with dirty water.



START WITH GRATITUDE!



For this demonstration, you will need two clear cups.

- Fill one with clean drinking water.
- Fill the other cup with the same amount of water but add in food coloring, dirt, rocks, etc.
- Keep both cups hidden until it is time for the students to observe.

God wants our thoughts to be good. He created our minds to be creative, curious, and constantly thinking about how good He is! Let's look at this glass of water. What do you notice? It's water. It's clear and clean. If we were thirsty, we could drink this glass of water. When we think good thoughts, our minds are clean and clear and our hearts can be filled with joy. Now let's look at this cup.

What do you notice?

Is there anything different from the last cup we looked at?

That's right! It's not clean at all! It has dirt and rocks in it. We would not be able to drink this. When we fix our thoughts on Jesus and follow what the Bible tells us, it's easier to use the thoughts in our mind to think about something kind.

We all have the opportunity throughout our day to keep our thoughts clean and clear, like the water we looked at in the first cup. Let's look at our Bible verse which points out that we should think excellent things.



Direct students to the Bible poster on display and call on students to share observations.

Here's what our Bible verse says:

Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise.

— Phillippians 4:8b (NLT)

SCRIPTURE CONNECTION

"Excellent" is a big word! What do you think it means?

If something is excellent, it means that it is extremely good. Some words that mean something similar include: outstanding, super, awesome, marvelous, and wonderful.

"Worthy of praise" means something is so good, you could stand up, and cheer for it. It's that great. You could clap and jump up and down because of how great it is!

God created our minds to think all the time. This Bible verse reminds us that He wants us to think about good, super, and awesome things. God is love, and if our thoughts are full of love, we're on the right track to having Generous Thoughts.



Direct students to the Philippians 4:8 coloring page and provide time to complete it. If time allows, have students share a thought that is excellent or worthy of praise.

NOTES & IDEAS



PAUSE & PRAY

Dear Jesus, help us to listen to our thoughts, and recognize which ones You want us to get rid of and which ones You want us to keep. After students color and cut out their Ellie, staple the elephant to a sentence strip, and create a headband for students to wear. Have students put the headbands on and do the following activity:

I'm going to say some thoughts out loud and you're going to decide if they're Generous Thoughts or Stinkin' Thinkin'. Keep your headband on if it's a Generous Thought and remove your headband if it's Stinkin' Thinkin'.

- The blue sky and sunshine are so bright and beautiful this morning!
- I hope my friend is feeling better today after being sick.
- That grown-up just asked me to throw away my trash, but I don't want to.
- I'm excited to go visit my grandparents!
- My brother broke my toy and I don't want to be his friend anymore.
- The picture I drew didn't turn out the way I hoped, so I should stop trying.
- I'm so thankful for my family.

Whether you have your headband on or not, you can always choose Generous Thoughts over Stinkin' Thinkin'!

Generous Thoughts happen when we use the thoughts in our mind to think something kind. If we think back to our Bible verse, it reminds us to think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise. Did you know that you can even think excellent and Generous Thoughts about yourself? Let me give you some examples:

- My schoolwork looks awesome.
- I helped my mom unload the groceries and that makes me a good helper.
- I am a child of God.
- I love myself.
- I am creative.

Today you are going to take a moment to think of a Generous Thought about yourself. You might think in your mind — "I am a good student" or "I am a good friend to my little brother." Before we start, take a moment to think excellent and praiseworthy things about yourself.

- What makes you special?
- What does God say about you?
- What are you good at?



Call on students to share and write keywords on the board.

Think for a moment about a Generous Thought you have about yourself, and be ready to complete this sentence: A Generous Thought I have about myself is __



Teacher shares personal example.

Turn to the person sitting next to you and take turns sharing your Generous Thoughts.



After students have shared their personal thoughts with each other, ask for volunteers to share their Generous Thoughts with the class.

The Bible tells us that kind words are like honey. They are pleasant, fill our hearts, and make us feel great. Kind words are friendly. When we use kind words to make someone's day, we are using Generous Words.



Direct students to the Bible poster on display and call on students to share observations. Say the verse together as a class, or have students take turns saying the verse to a partner.



Direct students to the Proverbs 16:24 coloring page and provide time to complete it. As students color, share a generous, sweet-to-the-soul encouragement for each child. Fill the classroom with Generosity.

- 1. How did Polly feel when Franny said Generous Words to her?
- 2. How do you think Franny felt when she saw how much her words filled Polly with joy?
- 3. If someone is already having a good day and appears to be happy, is it okay to be generous with our words towards them? Why or why not?
- 4. What Generous Words have been spoken to you recently? How did it make you feel?

Listen carefully to what Franny told Polly in today's story: "Polly, you're not the worst. You're the best of your kind!"

When you are around someone who is bright or joyful, you can't help but feel the same way.

Franny gave Polly a compliment. A compliment is when we say a nice thing to someone. It's when we use Generous Words. Everyone appreciates receiving a compliment.



Teacher shares a personal story of receiving and giving a compliment.

Giving compliments feels just as good as receiving compliments. Franny's heart was full when she told Polly what she admires about her, and Polly's heart was filled with happiness when she heard these words.

I'm going to show you how good it feels to receive a compliment! When I say your name, please stand up, and receive the Generous Words I give you.



Close with a Compliment Circle. Have the class form a circle and take turns saying a compliment to the person next to them. Emphasize how Generous Words can make the class more generous in every way!

Play — Make Their Day. This is an opportunity for students to get up, move around, interact with one another, and put Generous Words into action!

Remember when Franny the Flamingo told Polly how much she loved seeing the joy and happiness inside of her? Franny shared Generous Words with Polly. When we say kind and Generous Words — the ones the Bible calls "words like honey" — we have the chance to fill someone's heart with joy. We can make them feel loved and known. Today we're learning a new game called — Make Their Day! It will help us practice using Generous Words!



Review directions for Make Their Day below and demonstrate a couple of rounds of the game in front of the class before playing as a whole group (model teacher/student, demonstrate student/student, then whole group).

MAKE THEIR DAY — GAME DIRECTIONS

- The teacher announces "Use what I say to make someone's day." and directs students to find a partner and stand next to them.
- The students need to find a new partner that they haven't connected with yet throughout the game.
- Once all the students have paired up, they will take turns using words to make their partner's day. This might be a compliment about something they're wearing, something they really like about them, or something they've noticed about them.
- After both students have had a chance to Make Their Day, the teacher and students will say "Use what I say to make someone's day." while students find a new partner and do the same exercise.
- The teacher continues the activity for the length of time that feels appropriate. Afterward, call on your students to share what they said and/or what they heard, and how it made them feel.

EXTENSION

Later in the program, students will learn that Generous Words can be asked as questions too. Being curious about people and asking about their lives is a great way to make people feel loved and known. If students are ready, go deeper into this idea and provide the option to say a compliment or ask a question.

As the school year progresses and students become stronger communicators, encourage them to avoid kind words about appearance and clothes and instead share a Generous Word about who they are on the inside and their character traits.

Examples:

- Librarian: I like how organized your library is. I love when I visit the library and you smile at me. Thank you for getting great books!
- Lunch Staff: Lunch is my favorite time of the day because of the great food you make. Thank you!
- Janitorial Staff: I appreciate how hard you work to keep the campus clean. Thank you for keeping our school nice!
- Principal: You are an amazing principal and leader. I love my school!
 Thank you for making our school great.
- Playground Aide: Thank you for always keeping me safe on the playground. Thank you for watching and helping us!

Play — Make Their Day — with your special guests. Snap some photos of the looks on their faces to show students how much Generous Words impact others. After guests leave, discuss the experience and how it felt to honor special people with so many Generous Words.

Have you ever seen an adult use any of these to pay for something? (Show credit cards, checks, and smartphone.)

While we need money to pay for things, it's also important to have a good place to keep our money until we're ready to spend it.



If the teacher has a piggy bank on hand, demonstrate with play money:

- This is money I earned from working hard.
- This is money that was given to me on my birthday from someone that loves me.
- I found this lucky penny on the ground!

You can leave money in a piggy bank for a long time to save money. It's always fun to earn and receive money, but that doesn't mean it has to be spent! Let's hear about ways you've earned or received money.



Call on students and have them put a pretend coin in the piggy bank as they share (if you are using a piggy bank).

You've seen your grown-ups spend money in different ways. You may have earned money or been given money to keep in your piggy bank too. But did you know there's something else you can do with the money in your piggy bank? You can give your money to others!

LESSON 1 (CONTINUED) ENTER THE ADVENTURE

START WITH GRATITUDE

When you find some coins or you earn money by helping around the house, you may put the money in your piggy bank to save it. During this part of our adventure, we are going to learn what it means to be generous with our money. Of course, whenever you're thinking about how to spend and use your money, you should always talk to your grown-ups first!

When we're generous with our money, we can think of it this way: "Use my money, no matter how much, if there is a life I can touch."

Let's repeat that together! Touching someone's life doesn't mean that you use your fingers or sense of touch. It means that you've done something that makes a person feel known, special, and reminded that they matter.



Call on students to share ideas about how they could use their money to touch someone's life and bless others.

The options are endless! When we are generous with our money, we use our money, no matter how much, if there is a life we can touch.

Let's take a look at the Bible verse on our EXPLORE THE BIBLE poster. Please look at the picture and be ready to tell me one thing you notice about what you see on the poster.

One day, Jesus was with His followers in the temple. People went to the temple to give an offering, which means they put their money in a collection box. This money would be used to keep the temple open for worship and learning about God. It would also help people in need. Many people who had a lot of money wanted everyone to see them put a lot of money in the box — they were trying to look really important in front of everyone. They wanted to make sure people knew they had a lot to give.

Then, Jesus noticed a poor widow who didn't have very much money at all. In fact, she only had two coins. This woman put her two small coins into the collection box and gave all that she had!

When Jesus saw this, He told His disciples that the poor woman put more into the collection than anyone else, because she gave all she had. Even though others gave more coins and money, they still had a lot left over. This woman gave everything she had, which meant more to Jesus than the amount the others gave.

When we're generous with our money, we use our money, no matter how much, if there is a life we can touch. The woman in this Bible story used her money to give back to God at the temple. God doesn't care how much we give, but He is so delighted when we give with a cheerful heart.



TEACHER TIP

Students may ask about the meaning of a widow. Depending on the teacher's knowledge of students' background and if this is a good time for a class discussion, this is an opportunity to explain what a widow is. The teacher can share how God calls us to be generous to widows, using a simple explanation such as — a widow is a woman whose spouse has died.



Direct students to the Mark 12:41-44 The Widow's Offering coloring page. If time allows, have students share an experience when they had a cheerful giving experience.

When we're generous with our money, we use our money no matter how much, when there is a life we can touch. Jesus was so touched when the woman at the temple gave all she had. Today we're going to see what happens when a kid, just like you, chose to be generous with her money.

GRACIE'S STORY

Gracie loved anything sparkly — stickers, shoes, dresses — they all had to have sparkles. But the one item she was missing in her collection was sparkly nail polish. She had been saving money from her chores to buy the nail polish. She soon had the money to buy not just one bottle of nail polish, but two.

She couldn't contain her excitement as she and her mom walked toward the nail polish aisle in the store. As she stood in front of the pink, purple, and gold sparkly nail polish, she couldn't choose which ones to buy. She continued to look through the colors when she noticed that there were two older girls standing in the same aisle counting their money and holding a bottle of nail polish.

Gracie paused for a moment, looked up at her mom, smiled, and said, "Mom, I think I should buy the nail polish for them out of my money." Her mom smiled down at Gracie, collected money from her purse, and handed it to the girls so that they could buy the nail polish they wanted. As Gracie and her mom paid for the one bottle of pink sparkly nail polish, Gracie looked back up at her mom and said, "Mom, that was so fun!"

On that day Gracie learned to use her money, no matter how much, if there is a life she can touch.

To open this lesson and begin a conversation about time, students will identify various activities and experiences from their daily life and consider the time it takes to do each one. Post the Morning to Evening slide and call on students to share typical activities they participate in during their day. As they share, draw or write student responses at the appropriate time of day on the board.



Today we're going to think about all that happens in one day in the life of you — a student! This morning, you woke up and started a new day. Tonight, when the day is done, you'll get into bed and get a good night's sleep. In between the time you wake up and go to bed, there are a lot of things to do!

Let's fill in a day and identify some of the things you experience in one day. Comments may include: waking up, eating breakfast, driving to/arriving at school, recess, eating lunch, special classes, getting on the bus to go home, after school activities, homework, reading, playing outside, eating dinner, bathing, praying with family members.

While this schedule we made may not show exactly what you do every day, it gives us a good idea of what activities can fill up your day when you're a student. There are 24 hours in a day, so we have lots of hours to fill when we're not sleeping at night! There's one thing we can do at ANY point in ANY day — it can even be done in everything we wrote on the board! Are you ready to hear our next way of giving generously? It's being generous with our TIME!

Being generous with time means we use moments in our day to put Generosity on display.

We put Generosity on display when we take the TIME to look around us and consider what others might need, how we can help others, and the ways we can give our love to others.

Pose some questions to allow students to understand how we can use any moment/time in our day to give to others. Some questions or discussion topics include:

Can we be helpful at our house? How? That takes time!

Can you smile at someone that walks by you? That takes very little time!

Could you stop what you're doing and help your little brother who is struggling with his Lego creation? That takes time!

Could you help your grown-ups set up the table for dinner? That takes time!



Close by sharing specific examples from the classroom that have been observed recently — what choices have students made recently that demonstrated giving their time to help others?

Today we're going to review a familiar Bible story that reminds us why listening to God and giving Him our time grows our hearts and our faith.

When we use the moments in our day to put Generosity on display, we help, serve, and support others. Showing people God's love through our actions is what The 7 Ways of Living Generously are all about!

One person that spent a lot, and I mean, A LOT of his time following God, was Noah. Noah didn't just use a moment in his day, nor just a week, month, or year. Noah spent YEARS following God's direction and using his life to give.

Let's look at the story together! You will look at four pictures that tell the story of Noah's Ark, but they're all mixed up! Your job is to put them in order, then we'll retell the story together.



Hand out the Noah's Ark card sort activity and ask students to cut out the cards. When they are finished, direct them to look at the details of each one, then work with a partner to put them in order. Emphasize the time that Noah spent building the ark so that students understand why he was generous with his time!

Noah loved God and God told Noah to build an ark.

Noah and his family spent years building an ark.

They collected two of every animal and loaded up the ark with Noah's family for the flood.

After the flood, God put a rainbow in the sky as a sign of His promise to never flood the Earth again.

Noah's story is very special. God used Noah to change the world and give the world a second chance. Even though we might not be a hero of the Bible, God can use us to change the world too. Noah was willing. This means he was ready to go, prepared to help God with whatever needed to be done. When we're willing to look around at the people around us, we'll see opportunities to give our time to others.

Noah was an expert on Generous Time because he loved God. When we choose to share The 7 Ways of Living Generously, we don't give and share, and show we care because we want to look good or make others think we're extra special. We do this to share the love of Jesus and point people to Him, just like Noah did.

Let's look at the Bible verse on our EXPLORE THE BIBLE poster. Have students repeat parts of the verse and share a personal reflection about why Noah's story is important.

It was by faith that Noah built a large boat to save his family from the flood. He obeyed God, who warned him about things that had never happened before.

— Hebrews 11:7a (NLT)



Direct students to the Hebrews 11:7a coloring activity on page 24 and provide time to complete it. If time allows, have students retell the story of how Noah was generous with his time to build the ark.

Take the cards home and retell the story to someone in your family! Be sure to let them know that Noah chose to obey God and was generous with his time. We give Generous Time when we use any moment in our day to put Generosity on display!

If you've ever been given a new Lego set, you've most likely seen one of the building instruction booklets that come with it. Smaller creations might take you 30 minutes to put together, but some Lego sets come in huge sizes. For example, the Lego Art World Map includes almost 12,000 pieces and can take up to 33 hours to complete! In 33 hours, you wake up, go to school, come home, eat dinner, go to bed, and go to school for another day!

If 33 hours sounds like a long time to construct something, imagine how Noah felt when it took him years to build the ark! Noah never hesitated when it came to using his time for God. Thankfully, God promised to never flood the Earth again, so nobody will need to build another ark! However, we are given a new day when the sun rises. We have opportunities throughout every day to share our time with the people around us.



Post the Morning to Evening slide from the introductory activity. This time around, during the brainstorm session below, students will think of ways they can give their time and be helpful, kind, and friendly to serve others throughout the course of an entire day.

Remember when we listed all the things you might do from the moment you wake up until you go to sleep? What was the one thing that you can do at ANY point, during ANY of those activities? Give! Let's think about how we can give others our time throughout the day.

As you think about your day today, what you've done so far, and what you'll probably do after school, or later at home, ask yourself:

Who can I help?

Who could use a friend?

What can I do for my family members?

What can I do to be a good brother or sister?

Are there moments in the day that I have left for a chance to give?

Aim to get out of the classroom and complete this activity the same day or as soon as possible! Ideas for a classroom activity that allows students to experience how it feels to give their time:

- Stand at the entry doors of the school at the beginning or end of the day and wave to/greet people, with the goal of spreading kindness and cheer to others.
- Be last out to lunch intentionally so others can get their food first.
- Offer a day when students/families can come to the classroom early to help clean and organize.
- Use recess time to pick up trash on the playground, clean the lunch table area, or help a staff member with a project.

Ask your child about our story — Ellie the Elephant and the Adventure of Stinkin' Thinkin'.



Generous Conversations: Family Discussion Starters

- Think of two kind thoughts about someone in our family, then share your thoughts out loud.
- Stinkin' Thinkin' happens when our thoughts are unkind and cranky, and when we believe the worst. When has this happened to you? How did it make you feel?
- Should we keep all of our thoughts inside of our mind, or share our thoughts with others? Why?



Generous Home: Bring Generosity home with these ideas!

- If your child is challenged or discouraged with an activity, remind him/her to use a thought in their mind to think something kind about themselves.
- Model how to give others the benefit of the doubt for your child. This will teach them how to think generously and believe the best about others.
- Play What Would You Think. Share these real-life scenarios with your child and come up with Generous Thoughts you can think about each one. 1. I just sat down for breakfast and my dad made me scrambled eggs, but I wanted oatmeal. 2. My family is going somewhere new for vacation, but I wish we were going to the mountains. 3. Someone just stepped on my foot. 4. That's not fair.




